The Urge to Merge October 24, 2023

There has been recent activity in the upstream sector of the oil business. There seems to be an immediate need for largesize companies to merge/acquire smaller companies.

In each case synergies and efficiency seem to be behind the mergers. These companies might appear large, but they must compete with much larger national oil companies. An Exxon or a Chevron account for only a small fraction of world supply.

The merger with Hess offers Chevron much needed access to production and reserves. It invites them into one of the most prolific finds in the last 10 years: Guyana.

Given the sharp swings in the oil markets, Hess buys into financial security. In the case of Pioneer, they buy into Exxon, one



of the best managed operating companies in the industry.

Exxon wins, as well, since Pioneer's Permian production and reserves fit nicely with Exxon's current operations.

p.s. It is a message from the industry to governments that they disagree with the forecasts on the demise of the oil and gas industry.
